How about it? Arnold Murdoch.



FLYING FUEL TANK

A Strange looking experimental plane landed in California recently after a record breaking five day flight.

The Voyager flew 11,857 miles without refuelling - 256 miles further than the previous best.

The 110 hr. flight was also 26 hrs more than the longest non-refuelled piston engine flight, made in 1931.

Now Voyager is to attempt a 25,000 mile round-the-world non-stop flight with-out refuelling.

The pilots made the flight in a tiny cabin barely four feet wide. Voyager, with its spindly 110 ft. wings filled with 1,500 gallons of fuel, is more like a flying fuel tank, cruising just below 10,000 ft. and averaging 100 mph.

The pilots anticipated a lot of problems, one being how to survive, but reported that they had adapted to the cramped environment very well.
